



Referendum Question:

Whereas current bylaws allow the Board of Directors to unilaterally close down a Service or program, henceforth called a Service, without any consultation with those affected by the closure, henceforth called a Stakeholder;

Appendix A: Service Protection

[Creation of] By-Law 26: Service Protection

In order to close down a Service with an operating budget of greater than \$50,000 and having existed for more than three (3) years, the following process must be conducted:

- 1. All Stakeholders of the Service must be identified
- 2. These Stakeholders must then be contacted about the Service being potentially closed
 - a. Stakeholders must be allowed to easily access digital and physical copies of detailed information about the Service not lawfully required to be kept private,
 - i. Detailed information includes but is not limited to:
 - 1. Full financial data
 - 2. Attempts to correct/improve the Service and their results
 - 3. Rationale for wanting to close the Service
 - 4. Other relevant information on the Service
- 3. The Board must then consult with these Stakeholders over the course of at least one (1) year by
 - a. Using all SFSS communication channels and in-person consulting options to obtain feedback on the effects the closure will have on the Stakeholders
 - i. Communication channels include physical, digital, and social media
 - ii. In-person consulting includes interviews, focus-groups, town halls, and other forms of direct consultation
 - iii. At least one (1) Stakeholder-wide survey must be conducted per term
 - iv. At least one (1) Stakeholder-wide in-person consulting must be conducted per month
 - v. All forms of consultation must be accessible
- 4. A consultation report must be produced and released to the membership
 - a. The report must be complete with descriptions of the Stakeholders identified, the method(s) of consultation, and the summaries of feedback from each Stakeholder
- 5. A question to close the Service must be put on the next scheduled referendum
 - a. The question should be clearly worded with a simple yes/no vote

Goal:

To restrict the board and/or admin from closing down large long running services or programs unilaterally. Instead, they must consult with stakeholders and make their case to the membership in a referendum. Basically, students are paying for this service, and they should be the ones to decide if it should be shut down. But to do that, they need detailed information on the positive and negative effects of closing that service or program down.

Ideally, this consultation process should be done independently to allow for a good thorough consultation process. But, just by making the closure process harder, that should encourage the board/admin to find workable solutions instead of closure.

Process Overview:

- 1. ID all Stakeholders of the Service/program/operation
- 2. Board states their detailed rationale for closing the Service/program/operation to these Stakeholders
- 3. Consult with them on the effects of the closure on said Stakeholders
- 4. Release to the membership a report on the consultations that include the positive and negative aspects of the closure
- 5. Put it up for referendum
