Synopisis:

It can be said that TA's contribute to our educational experience here at University almost as much, or sometimes even more than our professors. The overall student concern about the quality of TA's at SFU is something that has come up year after year. Due to the society's knowledge that Masters and PhD students are given preference in hiring over more qualified undergraduates, we can assume that knowledge in the subject is being valued over teaching ability. Proficiency in a subject does not equate to the ability to teach it well. The goal of this campaign would be to lobby SFU administration for higher hiring standards teaching assistants as well as regular and ongoing training.

The BC Open Textbook Project was created in 2012 and, the program produces free open source resources for students to replace standard, costly textbooks. Open textbooks can be accessed for free digitally or produced in print for about \$30. Currently there have been 588 known adoptions of Open Textbooks at 31 BC institutions and 12823 downloads (BC Campus, 2016). It is currently reported that 17,187 students use open textbooks in BC (BC Campus, 2016).

Executive Summary

Preface

The Simon Fraser Student Society (SFSS) represents 29, 994 undergraduate students attending Simon Fraser University (SFU or the "University") across three main campuses in Burnaby, Surrey, and Vancouver. We would like to thank the Government of British Columbia for the following investments:

- \$1.98 billion for advanced education
- \$2.6 billion in capital spending over three years by postsecondary institutions across the province in Budget 2017 (pg. 32)
- \$24.5 billion in support of infrastructure investments for hospitals, post-secondary, transit and roads over the course of the fiscal year (pg.31)
- The U-Pass BC program
- Maintaining the Tuition Limit Policy and limiting increases for tuition and mandatory fees at 2% per year.
- \$90-million investment for Energy Systems and Environmental Engineering Program by the federal and provincial governments

Now that the Provincial Government has realized a \$2.8 billion surplus for this fiscal year (2017/18), we would like to recommend that the committee take the following recommendations into consideration:

Recommendation 1

The creation of needs-based grants program for low-income students attending a BC post-secondary institution.

Background:


- Eligible full-time students who are low income income holders will receive non-repayable needs-based grants that enable them to access post-secondary education.
- offering students living in unaffordable housing marker a real educational opportunity that will improve their economic standing



Recommendation 2

Long term funding for the U-Pass BC program

Background:



94.0% approval rate at Spring 2016 U-Pass referendum

Student Loan program calculated student living allowance for public transportation in BC was \$105

U-Pass provides a critical service to post-secondary students in the Metro Vancouver region and it is vital that the provincial government commits to continuing this program.

Recommendation 3

Provide targeted funding to post-secondary institutions for mental health support services for students.

Background:

Simon Fraser Student Society Advocacy Survey (Simon Fraser Student Society, 2017):

• Over 61% of 492 students surveyed consider mental health very important.

StudentCare Survey (Simon Fraser Student Society, 2017):

- 76.0% say mental health is very important
- 71.4% placing mental health at the same level of importance as their physical health
 - 26.2% ranking their mental health above their physical health.
- 97.2% of respondents either agree or strongly agree that our society needs to reduce prejudice and discrimination against people experiencing a mental illness.
- 51.2% have personally experienced a mental illness
 - 52.4% have been treated negatively or unfairly in the past because of a mental health problem.
- 194% increase in claims for Psychology and Counselling services.
