## 6. PRESENTATION

## 6.1 SFU TUITION CONSULTATION

### **SUBMITTED BY:** President

PRESENTED BY: Simon Fraser University

- The SFU Administrative members presented on the SFU Budget Basics and Student Consultation to talk about budget, how consultation work, and financial aspects.
- The agenda is planning framework and financial context, current institutional priorities, thoughts on tuition, and student consultation.
- The fiscal year end and outlook updated: Financial results from the previous year are reported, and financial projections for the next year are updated.
- Campus consultations: Meetings regarding priorities are held, student feedback is gathered

on fees and priorities, and options are considered.

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- Development: Priorities are established and resources designated. Detailed budgets are developed for departments across the university.
- Review and Approval Budgets are collected, reviewed, and then sent to the SFU's Board of Governors for Approval.
- The SFU's consolidated budget is \$980 million. But a significant portion of that is restricted.
- The party contributing the funds e.g., Government agencies, donors, and companies.
- The SFU operational budget \$720 million. The operating budget is largely made of funds designated for teaching and operations they can be used at the university's discretion over the longer term.
- Over the shorter term there is little flexibility given contractual agreements.
- 50% of the funding comes from the government grants and 45% from tuition and student fees. And various other includes 5%.
- The factors influencing budget includes inflation that raises the cost of operating expenses.
- BC tuition limit policy caps the increases on tuition and mandatory fees.
- Decline in international students' enrolments as a result of domestic policy updates and geopolitical events.
- Strategic and priority investments.
- These increases are not fully funded by increases to the provincial operating grants; some salaries increase for faculty and staff are funded, but not all.
- In response to the Archeology Councillor, the SFU administrative mentioned that all information regarding revenues and investment of SFU is posted online.
- The Health Science Councillor mentioned that previously a lot of employees were laid off, tuition is increasing and is so much higher than domestic students. Yet there is not same number of services offered. Inflation can be blamed, but as students it is in their right to demand for services.
- The SFU Administrative member mentioned that it's a very tight situation. They can barely pay from expenses they have. Last year they had laid off and beside the inflation which is partly to be blamed. There were few factors that affected their budget significantly which included signification reduction of international students that caused a lot of shortfall \$15-16\$ million.
- In response to how they will communicate to the government regarding more money is needed if international students do not come in future years as well. They mentioned that BC government has been very supportive. Whereas the federal government has strict policies.
- In terms of student priorities there is financial support including graduate student support, academic excellence and academic support, health and wellbeing, housing, food, career exploration and preparation, transportation and campus life.
- The Psychology Councillor mentioned that one key observation from numerous student interactions is the importance of student engagement. They believe this aspect is crucial for both the overall wellbeing of students and the quality of their university experience. The SFU admin mentioned that student faculties and the dean have been working on this to have the students involved.
- The ISSU Councillor mentioned that one thing that they and other students have noticed is that scholarship like open scholarship have been dramatically reduced and made very inaccessible. Raising tuition should not come with lowered access to funding from

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accessible scholarships.

- The Archaeology Councillor asked whether in the previous years the demographic of those who filles the surveys out were an accurate representation of the diversity in the university. The SFU Administration members mentioned that this is something they would not know.
- The ISSU Councillor mentioned that open scholarship eligibility was decreased by brining up GPA minimum so that there is not a proportionate change and its reduction and they only did that after backlash from cancelling open scholarship all together.
- The Center of Accessibility has demanded more services for the students. There also has been a new accessibility act. The SFU is moving away to a social model and is trying to remove barriers so students can access services that they deserve and they can ask easily.
- The Computing Science asked that students after graduations struggle to find a job, if SFU can consult students on it and provide guidance it would be great. The SFU admin mentioned that apart from Co-op this is something they are looking into.
- The SOCA Councillor asked that what plans have been made to streamline healthcare career process for students. The SFU admin team mentioned that this would be a better question for career service department.
- In response to the VP External regarding with the survey coming up and considering rate cuts coming, what do the SFU Admin have in mind and if it have any impact on the survey. The SFU admin team mentioned that the plan is that in October they will analyze the data, the executive will review and report out on engagement and survey results. It will be reviewed by the budget committee.
- In November the tuition fees proposal will be shared with SFSS and GSS.
- They will collect feedback from SFSS and GSS.
- In December they will submit proposal with SFSS/ GSS feedback for January BOG.
- In response to what are the key priorities for the SFU administration for the students, they mentioned that academic excellence, health and well being, housing, food, career exploration, transportation, and campus life are key areas of need.
- The VP Equity mentioned that the process through which faculty or department spending decisions are made they mentioned are based autonomous. Is there any sort of standardization of how students are included in that process or that is sort of determined by faculty, the SFU Administration mentioned that right now they are trying to get money put through students directly and that goes through faculties. They are aware that they try to engage students but it is not standard. This supports generally the student experience that they are seeing. They think that people want to do well academically and they want to be in a good financial situation to do so. They want to be physically safe and well enough to do that.
- In response to the VP University regarding their concerns regarding food security and there are stories as such as extreme case of financial destitution, housing issues etc. has something changed, is there a greater issue around food security around housing security that is going to change in current environment to help the students. The SFU administrative members mentioned that they recently announced 475 beds / spaces for students coming. The government also made that announcement recently. But they are not going to be able to necessarily meet all of the distinct needs and individual needs of students. What they want to
- They would like to arrange for councillors to potentially obtain feedback from a form on each individual subject and then they can send it to their executives.

In response to the Health Science Councillor regarding if in terms of the feedback which ٠ they can definitely obtain from the student groups, is there a deadline or a certain time that the administrative team would like to obtain it from the Council to be working with. The administrative team from SFU responded that by the end of September is when the sample survey is closing, so within the next few weeks is something that will work.

- The Engineering Science Student Society encourages healthy relationships, creating learning opportunities, celebrate accomplishments, and host events and socials.
- The Frosh 2024: Camp Frosh event is scheduled as follows: On Monday – Welcome to Camp FROSH Social and Lunch. This will include welcome to FROSH speech and presentation. There will be premade sandwiches and juice boxed served and then time for mingling and introduction. The Costco sandwiches would cost \$561.12 and juice boxes would cost \$76.85.

On Tuesday – Trivia and Geoguessr night. Chips and juice boxes will be served. Chips would cost \$51.50 and juice boxes would cost \$57.09.

On Wednesday – Engineering Competition: Spaghetti Summit Challenge and Hot cocoa will be served. The members will use marshmallows and spaghetti to create structures. The winner will receive small prize.

On Thursday – Yard Games. Chips (\$51.50) and juice boxes (\$57.09) will be served. The yard game will cost \$161.78.

On Friday – Midnight Madness in collaboration with SEESS and MSESS. There will be food costing upto \$1600 for the event on Friday. Following that there will be t-shirts costing up to \$2279.20, and security \$1400/2.

- The overall budget for the event is \$7000.
- In terms of safety, the SFU security will be in attendance the entire night and will ensure safety amongst all Froshees.
- Each Froshee will fill out a waiver which acknowledges the inherited risks that come with FROSH, particularly Midnight Madness.
- Several people at Midnight Madness will have food safe, however all food served will be premade or prepackaged.
- In response to the Operations Manager regarding if any faculty has provided any support or any financial support they have received, they mentioned that a little bit of funding has been received. The amount of \$2,500 will be short. The amount given by faculty is for the full year.
- In response to the VP External regarding if anything has been done to cut down the cost for merchandise, the Engineering Science Councillor suggested that they have not considered lanyards. They would like to apologise for submitting the grant little late.
- In response to the VP External regarding how many attendees would be there, the Engineering Science Councillor mentioned that 280 estimates students would show up.

# **MAGNITUDE OF SFU'S BUDGET**

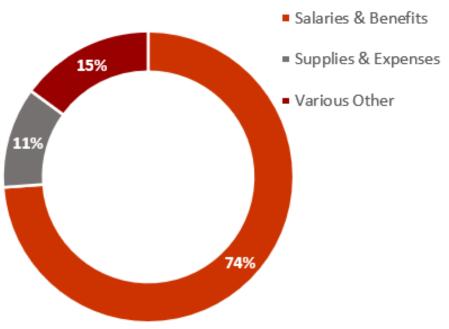

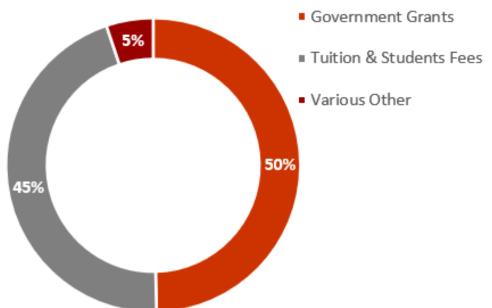


# **OPERATING FUNDING**

Undergraduate

- **Domestic students** tuition increases are limited to 2% per BC tuition limit policy.
- Existing international students have had tuition increases of no more than twice the domestic tuition increase.
  - Returning international students tuition increases will be limited to a maximum of 4%.

## Graduate

- All grad program tuition rates increased by 2%\*
