6.1 Mountain Valley Express SUBMITTED BY: VP External and Community Affairs

- Mountain Valley Express is a non-profit society committed to bringing a world-class regional rail network to the South Coast of British Columbia.
- Canada's railway legacy is fraught with oppression and caused irreparable damage to indigenous communities.
- The Mountain Valley Express Collective Society wishes to respectfully acknowledge the unceded territory of the South Coast.
- They further wish to acknowledge the unfair treatment that the constitution affords to rail and the way it dispossessed many nations' lands, spread disease, and starved indigenous peoples. As a society, they solemnly reflect and strive to better understand the atrocities of Canada's railway legacy.
- In the spirit of reconciliation, they pause to reflect on how MVX Nexus can serve as a platform for reframing rail in a different light as a means for reparative healing that embodies compatible values.
- This reframing can also enable Nations to harness their economic development potential while building an equitable and sustainable future for connecting all South Coast Nations and all people that call the South Coast home.
- The Opportunity:

- They plan to Maximize Utility, Maximize Connectivity, Allow Incremental Implementation, Superior to Car Travel, Leverage Development.
- Through this project them aim to keep the costs down, leverage development, cooperate and integrate.
- In terms of the next steps, they are seeking for seed funding, long term funding, and the engagement.
- Though the region and province, they have made significant strides in improving transit in recent decades, one key piece of the transit puzzle is still missing: frequent, regional rail service. Regions of a similar scale and level of ambition are already served with extensive regional rail networks. For example, Brisbane, Australia, a metropolitan area with a population similar to ours has a 689-km long regional network that connects its urban area with regional attractions and neighbouring cities. Without world-class regional rail, their region risks falling behind other global cities as well as failing to meet important environmental and equity goals.
- The arguments for regional rail can be summarized as follows:

• Economic: Regional rail would help reduce road congestion and provide fast and frequent transit between the Metro Vancouver, Fraser Valley, and Sea-to-Sky regions. It would help over 5 million annual tourists easily access Whistler and Squamish as well as provide access for future high-speed rail to the United States.

• Environmental: Currently, driving is the dominant mode of transportation in the Sea-to-Sky and Fraser Valley regions as well as the periphery of Metro Vancouver. Regional rail would provide a compelling, clean, and efficient transportation option for people who live in

these areas. Even with electric vehicles, rail transportation is far more efficient than typical private vehicle travel.

• Social: A world-class regional network will increase the number of job opportunities accessible to all residents. Regional rail corridors could serve many First Nation communities, spurring opportunities for economic development and reconciliation. Furthermore, it would reduce household expenses for those overburdened by the cost of car ownership and increase access for those who cannot afford a vehicle.

• Region Shaping: Regional rail would play a pivotal role in directing development, especially housing investment, around station areas, guiding regional growth and accelerating construction. MVX.VISION MVX Collective Society PO Box 70516 Oak Street Vancouver, BC V6M 0A3

- They recognize that our region has other transit priorities. They are not demanding that regional rail be put to the front of the line. Instead, we are requesting a minimum set of resources and attention be given to regional rail so that key planning issues are resolved years before any shovels are put into the ground. Transportation and land use are inextricably linked.
- While recent land use reforms in the form of up zoning have been made to address the housing crisis, without a matching transportation policy shift, they will risk similarly pressing problems in maintaining economic productivity and quality of life on the South Coast.
- They request that the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure, Rob Fleming and the TransLink Board: 1. Study regional rail and integration with future rail rapid transit on a variety of productive corridors. 2. Establishes a directory of properties that should be preserved/monitored to ensure they are designed to accommodate future regional rail/rapid transit stations and corridors.
- In response to the VP Internal regarding does this rail system replace our current sky train network, the Board Member of the MYX mentioned that it will complement it.
- It is an enhancement and not a replacement.
- In response to the President if approved, will this be funded by provincial government, they said they are open to it and will welcome private or government sectors. They are open to both the models.
- In response to the mathematics councillor regarding the timeline for this vision, the Board member of MYX mentioned that a lot of things are out of their control. But they believe for this to be done within 10 years.
- The VP Equity mentioned that they live in Langley and a project like this would be great to have in terms of accessibility as they currently travel to the Vancouver Campus and it takes a lot of time to get there.
- In response to the environmental impact of this project, the Board Member of MYX mentioned that they did an evaluation if their project requires environmental evaluation. But, their project does not. They expect a minimal effect on environment as at least 100 trips by car will be reduced. Car crashes will lower and other factors associated with people driving a lot.
- This will be 100% electrified. Using renewable and sustainable power.

They urged Councillors to join the BIPOC committee as there are a few spots available. The executives have been working on motions passed two years ago

VP University and Academic Affairs – The Diwali Event is out.

The survey that they worked on should be out next Monday. They are working on My SSP Campaign training.

They are also working with the EDI on SFU Equity Survey.

VP Events and Student Affairs – They just returned from their Leave of Absence. They put on numbers of events from September 3rd to September 20th.

They tried to promote the society as much as possible and promote cultural festivals.

VP External and Community Affairs – They have been working with a lot of student groups for get out to vote efforts.

They worked on having links and materials regarding election and vote now campaign.

Spoke with different provincial parties.

Within the committee passed honorarium where students are taught how to vote. They are working to represent SFSS at the Beedie Search Committee.

VP Finance and Services – Going over the budget reports with the auditor. Planning strategic goals on how the committee will be taking care of the budget proposed for next year.







To: The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and Translink.

We are Mountain Valley Express, a non-profit society committed to bringing a world-class regional rail network to the South Coast of British Columbia. Though our region and province have made significant strides in improving transit in recent decades, one key piece of the transit puzzle is still missing: **frequent**, **regional rail service**.

Regions of a similar scale and level of ambition are already served with extensive regional rail networks. For example, Brisbane, Australia, a metropolitan area with a population similar to ours has a 689-km long regional network that connects its urban area with regional attractions and neighbouring cities. Without world-class regional rail, our region risks falling behind other global cities as well as failing to meet important environmental and equity goals.

The arguments for regional rail can be summarized as follows:

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- Environmental: Currently, driving is the dominant mode of transportation in the Sea-to-Sky and Fraser Valley regions as well as the periphery of Metro Vancouver. Regional rail would provide a compelling, clean, and efficient transportation option for people who live in these areas. Even with electric vehicles, rail transportation is far more efficient than typical private vehicle travel.
- Social: A world-class regional network will increase the number of job opportunities
 accessible to all residents. Regional rail corridors could serve many First Nation
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 Furthermore, it would reduce household expenses for those overburdened by the cost of
 car ownership and increase access for those who cannot afford a vehicle.
- **Region Shaping:** Regional rail would play a pivotal role in directing development, especially housing investment, around station areas, guiding regional growth and accelerating construction.

We recognize that our region has other transit priorities. We are not demanding that regional rail be put to the front of the line. Instead, we are requesting a minimum set of resources and attention be given to regional rail so that key planning issues are resolved years before any shovels are put into the ground.

Transportation and land use are inextricably linked. While recent land use reforms in the form of upzoning have been made to address the housing crisis, without a matching transportation policy shift, we will risk similarly pressing problems in maintaining economic productivity and quality of life on the South Coast.

We request that the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure, Rob Fleming and the TransLink Board:

- 1. Study regional rail and integration with future rail rapid transit on a variety of productive corridors.
- 2. Establishes a directory of properties that should be preserved/monitored to ensure they are designed to accommodate future regional rail/rapid transit stations and corridors.
