- A rally will be held to protest the new budget cuts to major bus routes.
- 145 total bus routes are being removed.
- Save the Bus movement started by Movement.
- VP Internal listed to question whether this press release was developed in relation to the existing lobbying that VP External and the President work on.
 - VP External responded that this idea was going to be brought up in the external committees for discussion. It also seems that this movement is in line with the ongoing lobbying, so he is okay moving forward with this statement.
- VP External mentioned that the SFSS will work together with Movement to create custom social media content and draft a letter that will be used for lobbying.

9. NEW BUSINESS

9.1 PSA EID SOCIAL – MOTION COUNCIL 2025-03-19:03 SUBMITTED BY: VP Finance

President / Data Science

Whereas, the PSA Eid Event has received a staff funding recommendation of \$1,450 but is requesting additional funding to support the event;

Be it resolved that, the SFSS consider the appeal for increased funding for the PSA Eid Event.

Be it further resolved to approve an additional \$1000 from line item 5000K for the PSA Eid Event.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

- Philosophy listed to mention that this is a lot of funding going towards a club.
- VP Internal listed to mention that it seems like the costs are being split 50/50 between the SFSS and the PSA. So, it would be better if the PSA raised their ticket prices and was approved for a lesser amount.
- Geography listed to raise concerns about the event turnout seeing as the event is only being catered to 100 people, however DSU's typically host events of this size with similar grant requests.
 - Philosophy responded that the PSA is not a DSU but a club. Since grant funding has already been depleted for clubs, there is no obligation to approve the full

amount.

- Philosophy recommended that the PSA raise their ticket prices to cover more of the costs.
- ISSA listed to question where the funding would be coming from if the club grant has been depleted.
 - President responded by explaining that there is a fixed amount allocated towards clubs at the start of the year. However, it is possible to go over the budget and overspend that allocation.
- ESU listed to mention that she had attended a previous PSA event, and the ticket prices were higher.
- Geography listed to mention that the PSA held the same event in the previous year and only had an attendance of 32 members with \$7 ticket prices, so he does not have faith that they will achieve their projected attendance.
- Philosophy agreed with VP Internal about approving only \$1000 in funding from the SFSS and having the PSA raise their ticket prices.
- VP External ran some calculations and stated that a higher ticket price would help the PSA cover the costs of their event, so it would be best to approve \$1000.

An additional \$450 is required to cover essential expenses, specifically \$400 for food and \$50 for setup.

Whereas the Simon Fraser Student Society (SFSS) has historically organized and hosted the annual Holi event to celebrate cultural diversity, foster student engagement, and promote inclusivity on campus;

Whereas the 3rd Annual Holi Event aims to bring students together in a vibrant and festive celebration featuring music, colors,

Whereas the Large-Scale Events line item in the SFSS budget is designated to support significant student-centered events that enhance the university experience and promote campus life;

Be it resolved that the SFSS approves an allocation of \$25,000 from the Large-Scale Events line item to fund the 3rd Annual Holi Event;

Be it further resolved that the SFSS Events Committee work collaboratively with the necessary stakeholders to ensure the successful planning and execution of the event within the allocated budget.

- Philosophy listed to voice their dissent in allowing so much funding go towards this event.
 - VP University responded that engagement is at an all-time high and that this is a large-scale event that students are guaranteed to attend. He also reiterated that this event has previously been hosted and ran successfully.
 - VP Internal questioned how in previous years this event was hosted in equal collaboration with the Indian Student Federation (ISF) and is wondering why the ISF is taking a background role in this year's event since they were not involved in the presentation.
 - VP University responded that the ISF created the presentation and generated the data behind the event. They are also a leading partner in this event and are working closely with the SFSS. The only reason why they were not asked to present the event was because it is being hosted through the SFSS.
- SASS listed to question where the funding for this event is being drawn from and

whether this might lead to a deficit in the large-scale events budget.

- President responded that the funding will come from revenue generated by the event and that the large-scale events budget will only be used to make deposits.
- Data Science listed to ask why the event is being postponed this year by occurring later than the previous year.
 - VP University responded that this event will be at the end of exam period so that more people can attend. It will also be at a time when the weather is bright and sunny so that attendees do not get cold or sick.
- ISSA listed to question whether VP University has accounted for students who might be returning home at the end of the term.
 - VP University responded that he is not worried about attendance since there is high interest in this event.
- Geography listed to mention that the date of the event will be on move-out day for those who live on residence.
 - Geography further spoke about how in the previous year, planning began at the end of January. Meaning that event planning is quite late for the current timeline.
 - VP University responded that the team is the exact same team as the one running the previous year's event. So, they have experience in hosting an event of this scale.
- HSUSU listed to question if there will be any other events held for other cultural groups.

• VP University responded that he is open to working on future events for other cultural groups.

- Data Science listed to question why the VP Events did not present the event or read the motion.
 - VP Events responded that there is a direct conflict of interest since he was the previous President of the ISF.
 - Data Science also questioned whether this event would impact move-out day for those who live on residence.
- SASS listed to question whether the projected attendance will be present at the event if it is taking place both at the end of the term, as well as on move-out day for students on residence.
